

I. <u>General Dental Hospital Orientation Program – (All Year Level):</u>

VI. Policy Exam (PPQ) – (2nd & 6th Year Stuents):

Students' awareness of program policies and procedures

A policy and procedure quiz was initiated as a good practice in 2014-2015 to ensure students awareness of the regulations, their rights and responsibilities. Second year students are provided with the relevant policies and procedures by mail along with the schedule for the quiz. Student should score a minimum of 70% to pass the quiz, failing to pass he/she will re-take the quiz. They are also expected to submit the "declaration of the policy implementation" showing their acknowledgment about the policies. This practice resulted in increased students' awareness related to the rules and regulations, rights and responsibilities.

Students sit again for the PPQ in 5th year as a refreshment exercise. Additionally, when a new policy is developed, the PPQ exam related to that policy is administered for all students at the start of the academic year. This helps ensure that students are well-versed with the new policy.

VII. Basic Life Support (BLS) - (All Year Levels):

Tailored specifically for students, the Basic Life Support (BLS) program within the College of Dentistry serves as a vital training initiative. Designed in alignment with American Heart Association (AHA) guidelines, this program equips students with the crucial skills necessary to respond confidently in urgent situations. All student is required to successfully pass BLS before their clinical training.

Empowering Student Abilities: BLS teaches vital life-saving skills that enable students to recognize life-threatening situations quickly. Students gain confidence using an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) and learn how to give adequate ventilations, deliver efficient chest compressions, and recognize cardiac arrest and respiratory distress. These abilities are pivotal in improving survival rates during critical emergencies.

Incorporating AHA Expertise: The foundation of the BLS curriculum is built upon the latest AHA Guidelines for CPR and Emergency Cardiovascular Care. All students will gain knowledge based on the most current best practices and scientific advancements, ensuring that they're well-equipped to respond effectively in emergency situations.

Certified Competency: The BLS program receives endorsement from accredited institutes, ensuring students of its quality and credibility. Students acquire practical experience through hands-on simulations that prepare them to react skillfully in high-pressure circumstances. These abilities are valuable not only in the academic setting but also in a variety of professional and social contexts.
