





| ENGL201 | Listening Skills |
| The course emphasizes oral comprehension in academic settings: lectures, notetaking, and re-producing content after listening. Conversational English, monologues, dialogues and debates are also included. | |
| ENGL 202 | Speaking Skills |
| This course develops students' speaking skills and self-confidence. It provides academic content, vocabulary, and speaking strategies on different aspects of spoken language and situations (formal and informal and planned and spontaneous). It also gives students a chance to debate different issues and give short/simple structured presentations (prepared and impromptu). | |
| ENGL 203 | Reading Skills |
| Reading Skills is the first specialized reading course following the college requirement courses in the Preparatory Year. It is aimed at intermediate and post-intermediate-level students. It covers various types of texts and focuses on vocabulary building and comprehension. In addition, the course has an iQ online practice component which widens students' scope and reading abilities. | |
| ENGL 204 | Essay Writing 1 |
| This course helps the students to classify the types of essay writing such as descriptive and, cause and effect. It also provides guidance for writing as a process – including choosing a topic, brainstorming techniques, outlining, drafting, revising, and editing. | |
| ENGL 205 | Grammar in Use 1 |
| This course covers different aspects of sentence structure in English. It includes tenses, usage of modals, and nominal, adjectival, as well as adverbial phrases and clauses. The course focuses on exercises including meaningful drills based on ordinary everyday language. | |
| ENGL206 | Essay Writing 2 |
| This course focuses on different styles of essay writing such as descriptive, comparison and/or contrast, and argument. It also focuses on writing a well- coherent essay that goes through all writing steps, that are, brainstorming, outlining, drafting, revising, using rationale and examples, and editing. | |
| ENGL207 | Grammar in Use 2 |
| This course covers different aspects of sentence structure in English. It includes passive and active voices, the use of gerunds and infinitives, nominal as well as adjectival phrases and clauses. The course focuses on a variety of exercises and activities that encourage the students to produce correct sentences. | |
| ENGL 208 | The Art of Public Speaking |

“The Art of Public Speaking” course focuses on preparing students for public speaking varieties, equipped with confidence and strategies to produce and deliver effective informative or persuasive speeches/presentations.

| ENGL 209 | Introduction to Literature |
|-----------------|-----------------------------------|

This course gives a brief background of English literature and discusses basic concepts in literature applied to various genres such as poetry, fiction “short stories”, and drama. Along with the discussion of the key concepts and examples of relative works, the course provides the student with a wide range of literary vocabulary as well as critical perspectives for reading literature. The course must cover three genres that include a selection of poems (4-5), a one-act play, and short stories (3-4).

| ENGL 210 | Introduction to Linguistics |
|-----------------|------------------------------------|

An introductory course which surveys the main topics of General Linguistics. It starts from discussion of the general properties of human language and moves on to introduce the main levels of linguistic analysis: Phonetics, Phonology, Morphology, Syntax and Grammar, and Semantics and Pragmatics.

| ENGL 301 | Academic Writing |

This course aims to teach students the skills and techniques necessary for writing academic papers. Students will learn how to conduct academic research, combine their own ideas and arguments with sources, and how to quote, paraphrase and summarize information from other works.

| ENGL 302 | Introduction to Translation |
|-----------------|------------------------------------|

The course introduces students to the foundational knowledge of translation studies and the major theories, concepts, and principles in the field. It develops students’ awareness of the main methods, strategies and approaches in translation as well as the common challenges encountered when translating between Arabic and English. Students are introduced to a variety of translation resources and technological tools required throughout the translation process.

| ENGL 303 | Early Modern Literature |

This course introduces students to the historical/cultural origins of English Literature in the sixteenth and seventeenth century. Topics will include intellectual, political, and literary movements. A selection of poems and plays by writers such as Shakespeare, Marlow, Wyatt, Donne, Spencer, Milton, Herbert, Pope, Dryden, and Ben Johnson.

| ENGL 304 | World Literature |
|-----------------|-------------------------|

This course introduces students to a selection of texts from different genres from a variety of cultures and nations around the world spanning from 1960s to present. Students are given the opportunity to hone their close reading skills by studying a selection of contemporary world literature. It enables students to analyze in detail different ways in which cultural backgrounds can shape literary productions, and how stories, motifs and themes travel across national boundaries.

| ENGL 305 | Phonetics & Phonology |
|-----------------|----------------------------------|

The course offers a strong grounding in the study of speech sounds. The course is an introduction to the phonetic and phonological analysis of language, specifically English. The phonetics part covers the physical characteristics, while the phonology part covers how they are used by language users to create meaningful utterances. This course covers articulatory and acoustic phonetics, as well as core concepts of phonological theory.

Syntax and Morphology is the third and last course on English grammar and syntax. It introduces the main concepts of morphology, internal structure of words and process of word formations. It then introduces the basic concepts in English generative syntax. It also covers the recent advances in minimal syntactic analysis.

The course opens with a social, intellectual and cultural background of England during the late eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, that serves as a layout for discussion of the prescribed texts. Representative texts of Romantics and Victorian literature will be examined, analyzed and evaluated through comprehensive understanding of the literary history and contextual reading of the texts.

| ENGL 308 | Critical Theory |

This course delves into the critical landscapes of literary and cultural theory, charting a path from the interpretative inquiries of Plato and Aristotle through to the diverse critical movements that define the twentieth century and the contemporary scene. Students will examine, apply, and critique key theoretical frameworks such as Marxism, Structuralism, Reader-Response, and Post-Colonial Studies, assessing their utility in analyzing the literary process, including authorship, textuality, readership, historical context, and cultural implications. The course culminates in practical application, with students analyzing selected literary works through these critical lenses, enhancing their analytical skills and deepening their understanding of both literary criticism and theory.

| ENGL 309 | Semantics and Pragmatics |

Semantics and Pragmatics introduces basic areas of Semantics and Pragmatics with emphasis on different types of meaning and meaning relations. The course covers the topics sense and reference as well as main sense relations: hyponymy, synonymy, antonym, and polysemy. It briefly introduces the basic concepts in the study of figurative meaning. It also provides a preliminary coverage of Speech acts theory, Implicature and Grice Maxims.

| ENGL 310 | Language and Technology |

This course introduces the main areas in which computer technology and language converge to serve a variety of fields. These areas include a variety of applications based on Natural Language Processing (NLP), such as Computer-Assisted Language Learning (CALL), and distance learning.

| ENGL 351 | English Language Teaching |

The course introduces the students to the principles of English language teaching pedagogies (of the four language skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing), and to enable them to discover how to plan and deliver lessons in English language teaching. It also focuses on both theory and practice as well as encouraging reflection on students' language learning and teaching experience.

The main objective of course is English for Specific Purposes provides students with theoretical and practical insights into the use of English for specific and specialized purposes (ESP), specifically, the skills necessary to perform successfully in a variety of work contexts (corporate or academic) and situations (Business, Medicine, and Computer Science).

| ENGL 353 | Language and Media |

The course introduces the students to key concepts and theories on language and media. It provides them with the tools to analyze different types of media discourse. It highlights the impact of media communication on language use and social relationships. It also encourages a more critical usage of media.

| ENGL 311 | Translating Text Types |
|-----------------|-------------------------------|

Translating Text Types (Arabic-English/ English-Arabic) focuses on practicing the translation of four main text-types: journalistic texts, legal texts, advertising texts, and tourist texts. The course includes both theoretical and practical components. The theoretical part introduces students to discourse concepts such as text types, register, and genre in relation to the translation of various text types as well as translation procedures to deal with translation issues that arise from differences in these discourse concepts between the two languages involved. From the media type, newspaper front-page articles are selected; from political, social, sport and economic news. From the legal texts, official certificates, forms and excerpts from legal contracts are selected for translation. From the tourism sector, brochures and museum texts are practiced. From advertising, newspaper and TV advertisements are practiced.

| ENGL401 | Modern Literature |

This course offers a survey of Western modernist texts (roughly late 19th century through the second World war). Students will be introduced to the cultural and artistic aspects of modernism and its manifestations in different literary genres such as poetry, fiction and drama. Students will engage in a close reading of literary works in the context of the period. Authors may include T.S. Elliot, Joseph Conrad, Virginia Wolf, Bernard Shaw.

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| Elective Course 2 (Literature) | |
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| ENGL 451 | American Literature |
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The course is designed to provide students with a comprehensive understanding of the evolution and development of the American literary tradition with a focus on literature produced from the 1950s onwards. The course centers on the intricate interplay between American literature and its socio-political context, illuminating how these forces have shaped the nation's literary output. Along with the literary movements such as Naturalism and Regionalism, the cultural myths, values, and unique historical processes that distinguish

American literature from its English and European counterparts are investigated. In line with contemporary scholarship in American literary studies, the recognizes the significance of multicultural literary works and the contribution of often marginalized voices such as Black Americans and Arab Americans. This approach allows students to trace the evolution of American literature, from the era of the early settlers to the complexities of Postmodernism. Students should be able to discuss, the interdependent relationship between American literature and popular culture, shedding light on the intersections and influences that have emerged over time.

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| ENGL 452 | Short Story |
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This course surveys the short story as a modern literary genre from the nineteenth century to the present. Students will critically analyze short stories that are derived from different cultural contexts representing a range of styles, themes, and social issues. The course will take various approaches to the short story, including the impact of modernism, the postcolonial short story, varieties of style and narrative technique, and the representation of class, race, ethnicity, and gender in the short story. A minimum of six short stories is to be covered.

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| ENGL 453 | Science Fiction |
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This course is designed to increase students' knowledge of the literary genre known as Science Fiction. It will survey the history of the genre and then delve into representative themes, rhetoric, and methods of storytelling in texts, films and other media. Students will study the history, exciting contemporary trends, and the relevant contemporary issues in Science Fiction, including dystopia vs. utopia, artificial intelligence, current theory concerning technology, cloning and physical science, human psychology in a futuristic environment, and the rise of Cyberpunk and new Alternate Reality literature within the genre.

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| ENGL 402 | Discourse Analysis |
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This course presents the essential approaches that students need to know when doing discourse analysis for the first time. The areas include discourse and society, doing discourse analysis, discourse and conversation, multimodal discourse analysis, and discourse and digital media.

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| Elective Course 3 (Linguistics) | |
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| ENGL 454 | Sociolinguistics |
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Sociolinguistics is the study of the interaction between language and society. This course introduces major concepts, theories, methods, issues, and debates within the field. It helps students develop a critical perspective on the social factors and features of language use and variation, linguistic or social, based on context whether monolingual, multilingual, or digital.

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| ENGL 455 | Psycholinguistics |
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Psycholinguistics introduces the main areas of psycholinguistics. It covers the main mechanisms involved in natural language processing, semantic representation, linguistic primitives and the psychological nature of concepts. It also reviews selected areas of language pathology. The course also investigates language processing by means of laboratory-based experiments and using field experimental tools in research.

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| ENGL 456 | Corpus Linguistics |
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Corpus linguistics introduces the methods in which electronic text databases (corpora) can be used to do research and investigate in linguistics and language studies. It covers a range of different corpora (spoken, written, historically and socially differentiated, single genre and multi-genre). The course encourages to develop an in-depth learning of various corpus, tools and resources through case studies research and examples.

Elective Course 4 (Translation)

ENGL457 Audiovisual Translation

This course introduces students to the theory and practice of audiovisual translation (AVT). Due to the expansion of digital video content nowadays, there is an increasing demand for translation of such content. AVT is a very distinctive field in translation, with several modalities: subtitling, dubbing, and audio-description to name a few and each has its specific characteristics, challenges, and requirements. The practical focus of this course will be on subtitling only. Students will use up to date subtitling technologies to translate authentic material taking into consideration linguistic and cultural constraints in both languages.

ENGL 458 Introduction to Interpreting

The course introduces students to the foundational knowledge and skills required to pursue their career as interpreters. It provides an overview of the discipline of interpreting studies, including its history, key concepts, modes of interpreting as well as interpreters' roles and the code of ethics. The course focuses on developing the fundamental practical skills required to perform interpreting tasks such as glossary building, active listening, memory training and note-taking. Students start with practicing sight translation and note taking and moving to short consecutive interpreting of a few short segments (clauses, phrases and sentences).

ENGL 459 Translation & Technology

The course is designed to develop knowledge, skills and competence in the field of translation technology, this course introduces students to specialist technologies used in the translation industry, giving students hands-on experience of these technologies, and encouraging critical reflection on their value.

ENGL 403 Research Methodology & Design

Research Methodology and Design is a basic course which prepares students for designing and carrying small-scale research projects in the area of linguistics, literature and translation. The course covers the various stages involved starting with finding a topic to writing out the research proposal. It deals with the different stages of writing a research proposal. The course deals with the different methodological approaches according to research area. The course also covers research techniques and styles such as the MLA and APA style.

Elective Course 5 (Literature)

ENGL 460 Topics in Film Studies

This course is an introduction to the key principles of film studies, including film theory, history and genres. The course focuses on critical and cultural approaches to film analysis. Students will engage with global cinema from different critical approaches such as feminism and postcolonialism.

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| ENGL 461 | Children's and Young Adult Literature |
| <p>This course offers a survey of literature written for children covering both traditional and contemporary texts. Students will be introduced to the historical development of children's literature and its genres. Representative texts will be considered both for their literary features as well as what they have to offer for children. Readings may include fairytales, domestic fiction, fantasy, etc. Students will engage with a range of a variety of critical approaches to reading children's literature.</p> | |
| ENGL 462 | Storytelling in the Digital Age |
| <p>This course asks why is it so necessary to tell stories? What impact does the way we tell tales have on how we view the world? How can the language or media we use influence how a story is received? This course focuses on non-print mediums used for storytelling. Storytelling in a Digital Age looks at the development of new technologies and how they were and still are employed to tell stories. Text, photos, video, audio, social media features (e.g. Tweets), and interactive elements are all examples of mediums used in digital storytelling. A digital story is a multimedia presentation with a narrative structure that incorporates a range of digital elements (a story). In response to the new demands of the information age, students need to be capable of integrating technology across the field of literature. This course will introduce to students the fundamental concepts and tools needed to create a digital story.</p> | |
| Elective Course 6 (Translation) | |
| ENGL 463 | Creative Translation |
| <p>"Creative Translation" is a practical course which focuses on translating creative texts such as poetry, prose and oration. The course introduces students to the rhetorical and stylistic features of Arabic and English literary texts. Students practice analyzing and translating a variety of creative texts and develop different strategies to approach translation problems emerging from the texts.</p> | |
| ENGL 464 | Translating Terminology |
| <p>The course provides students with a theoretical and practical background of professional practices in translating terminology between Arabic and English with focus on Arabization. It provides basic theoretical knowledge of the concept of terminology and types of technological tools used in translating terminology. It also discusses the concept of Arabization and its methods and procedures in translating technical and scientific terms from English into Arabic. Students will apply their knowledge in translating scientific and technical texts between English and Arabic.</p> | |
| ENGL 465 | Consecutive Interpreting |
| <p>"Consecutive interpreting" is a practical course which focuses on developing the skills of producing an oral translation (directly after hearing the Source Text). The course develops students' skills required for consecutive interpreting such as note-taking, memory skills, glossary building, prompt text analysis, etc. The texts used in the course are mainly from political and business domains as well as formal speeches.</p> | |
| ENGL 404 | Graduation Project |

"Graduation Project" is a course which makes use of previous course in terms of application of methodology and content. Students choose one of the three main domains (language, translation or literature) to work on and produce a project under supervision. The choice is guided by the student's performance in previous courses. The project can be based on work or field experience (depending on availability) or on research relevant to the student's orientation and future work.


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| ENGL 444 | Field Training |
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This course requires students to use their knowledge and skills of English studies to perform different professional tasks which vary from writing reports, assisting in the teaching process, content creation or editing, and performing administrative tasks.
